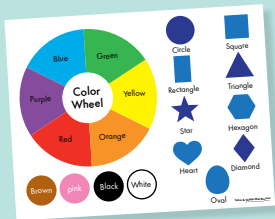

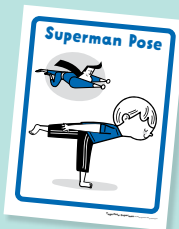

This month, your child will explore what it means to be a superhero, not just with capes and costumes, but with kindness, helping others and using their imagination. Through stories, movement, pretend play and hands-on discovery, children will learn that **everyone has the power to be a hero!**

Superhero Dress-Up: Children explore imaginative play by dressing up and pretending to be heroes.

Super Powers: We discover that kindness, sharing and helping are real-life superpowers.

Saving the Planet: Children practice caring for the environment through simple actions.

Everyday Superheroes: We celebrate helpers at home, school and in the community.

Chalk Shapes

WHAT?	HOW?	WHY?
This week, your child has learned about different shapes and explored shape games.	You can take learning outside by drawing chalk shapes on a sidewalk or driveway. Invite your child to walk along the shape path and jump from shape to shape as you name each one.	This activity helps your child begin to recognize shapes during play. Hearing shape names supports their ability to connect words to the shapes they see.



Super Friends

WHAT?	HOW?	WHY?
This week, your child learned that being kind and helpful makes them a superhero. In stories like <i>Mouse's Super Power</i> , your child discovered that friendship and caring for others are powerful skills.	You can encourage your child to practice "superpowers" at home by sharing, helping and showing kindness. Noticing and naming these moments helps reinforce these behaviors.	Recognizing kind actions helps your child understand empathy and build positive social habits.



Wipe Clean

WHAT?	HOW?	WHY?
This week, your child learned about different ways to help at home and explored simple helping routines.	You can invite your child to help by giving them a washcloth and going on a "dust hunt" together around your home.	This activity supports your child's attention span and builds early sequencing skills as they look, find and wipe.

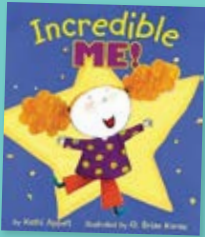


Imagine If..

WHAT?	HOW?	WHY?
Your child used their imagination to think about doing amazing, "super" things, like flying, helping others and going on adventures.	You can extend this learning by playing "Imagine If..." during walks or daily routines. Invite your child to imagine flying like a superhero, helping someone in need or having a special power.	Imaginative play supports your child's creativity, language development and problem-solving skills.
